- 1 What character do you like the most in your book? Why?
- 2 Summarize the story. Be sure to tell me about the beginning, middle, and end.
- 3 What is the main problem of the story? If you know, how was the problem solved?
- 4 Would you like to be a character in this story? Why or why not?
- 5 How do you feel about this story? Would you recommend it to someone else? Why or why not?
- 6 Choose a picture or illustration from the book. Write a description of what is happening.
- 7 What is the lesson or moral of the story?
- 8 How does the main character change from the beginning to the end of the story?
- 9 If you could trade places with one of the characters, who would it be? Why?
- 10 Is there anything you would change about this story? What would it be? Why would you change it?

Non-Fiction Responses

- 1 Explain the most interesting thing you learned and why it stood out to you. Be specific.
- 2 What are two new pieces of information that you learned from your reading?
- 3 What is your opinion on the topic you read about? Did you enjoy reading about this topic? Why or why not?
- 4 Does this book remind you of something in your life? Write to tell more about how the book topic connects to you.
- 5 What is the main idea of the text? List 3 details from the text that support the main idea.
- 6 After reading the article or selection, what are 2 questions that you have that you could research to find more about?
- 7 Choose a text feature, such as a diagram, map, chart, graph, or image that is important to the text. Explain what you learned from it.
- 8 Use who, what, when, where, and why to summarize what you read.
- 9 What was the author's purpose for writing this text? Ex: inform, persuade, entertain, explain how...
- 10 Identify a cause and effect in the passage. Explain how they are connected.
